Making and applying Gesso

The making of Gesso follows on from the Rabbit Skin Glue (RSG) fact sheet. It is a tricky skill to master and its application is affected by the room temperature and humidity.

You require a kitchen stove or laboratory hot plate, and a bain-marie. This is just one process in the making of a gilt frame.

Making Gesso:

- Create the rabbit skin glue (RSG) as above
- Re heat the RSG, once the rabbit skin glue is warm and in liquid form, take
 off the heat and mix in the calcium carbonate (chalk) slowly looking for a
 consistency of single cream and no bubbles. (note there is no measurements,
 but start with around 50ml of RSG and add the whiting until you get a single
 cream consistency.
- Note that if applying to timber frames the timber should be sized with at least one coat of RSG, and allowed to dry before applying Gesso.
- Paint the gesso on in layers. Don't go over the gesso when wet as you'll
 remove what you've just put on and don't let it go dry either. Add a new layer
 when the previous layer of Gesso is just damp to the touch. If you get this
 wrong, then the gesso will delaminate!
- Keep the gesso warm (in the Bain-Marie pan) between layers but you don't need to keep it on the heat.
- You need to do at least 7 coats to create a thick layer.
- The gesso does not keep and any leftover will have to be discarded.
- Sand back to remove any lines and imperfections and eventually use a 6000 grade paper for a 'glass smooth' finish.
- The frame is now ready for the application of Bole clay.
